Ignatian Corner

In A Simple Life-Changing Prayer: Discovering the Power of St. Ignatius Loyola's Examen, Jim Manney provides an approachable and concise (re)introduction to the 500-yearold prayer that is foundational to Ignatian spirituality and can be prayed by anyone at any time of day. The examen changed Manney's life because it was "focused on God's presence in the real world. It looked to a God who was near to me, present in my world, and active in my life. It told me to approach prayer with gratitude, not guilt. It helped me find God in my life as I lived it, not in some heavenly realm beyond space and time. The examen had me take myself seriously, as I was, not as I wished I was or thought I could be someday if I worked hard enough." Published in 2011 by Loyola Press, Manney's text invites our lives to be changed by this prayer as well. The book is also available in Spanish.
